- Zhu Qiang
- His lower arm was amputated while he was making plastic bags for American supermarkets



- Ho Yongjiang, 39
- Made furniture bound for U.S. before amputating his thumb.



- Li Xueping.
- Lost three fingers making kitchen and bathroom equipment for U.S. export.



- He Yuhun, 36
- Suffers from benzene poisoning and anemia
- Painted and varnished furniture for Restoration Hardware, Ethan Allen Furniture and other U.S. companies.



- These three young women made nickel-cadmium batteries by hand.
- Exported to U.S. companies, including Rayovac and Eveready.
- Women are now suffering from cadmium poisoning.



- Patients in the Guangdong Hospital for Treatment and Prevention of Occupational Diseases.
- The woman (right) worked in a factory that supplied cell phone shells to U.S. companies. She suffers from solvent poisoning.

• Dying from silicosis as a result of making parts for Char-Broil gas stoves which are shipped to the U.S.
